and for the young ravens | when they cry.

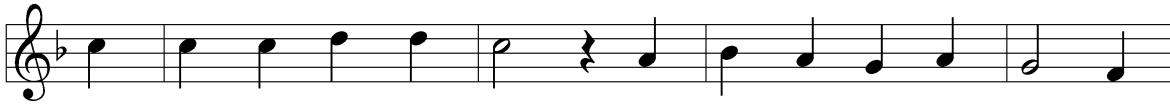
¹¹He is not impressed by the might | of a horse;*

in those who await his | gracious favor.

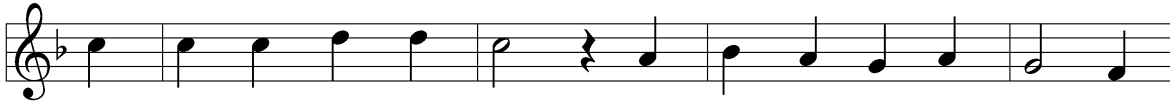
